Hi again. This is Paul and this is Practicast’s Word of the Day and today’s word is “**gullible**”. The definition of gullible is to be easily deceived or cheated so let’s see what that means. So if you want to describe someone who is gullible because mostly this is for a description of a person. A person who is very trusting, who is probably is very simple and innocent.
