As a bonus word, the other day I heard the word **"portmanteau"**. This word is a word that describes the combination of two words.

For instance, Brad and Angelina becomes Brangelina^[1]. This is a portmanteau.

And Korean and English: Konglish.

"Konglish", the next time you hear that word you can think of it as a portmanteau. This word was originally used in the 1800's. And then recaptured by Louis Carol, the author of "Alice in Wonderland"^[2].
